- Board Office staff and Information Technology (IT) staff worked to stop the video livestream, and the Zoom meeting was ended and restarted.
- The Zoom Bomb incident was live approximately 30 seconds.
- Board Office and IT staff reviewed current meeting protocols and identified additional protocols the county could implement to substantially reduce or eliminate the risk of future disruptions.

RESOLUTION #2024-004

WHEREAS,

1. Every person in Benton County, State of Oregon, and the entire United States deserves high quality healthcare; and

2. although the State of Oregon has made great strides in increasing our healthcare coverage through Medicaid expansion, we struggle to ensure quality healthcare for all, with over 253,800 people, or 6% of residents (including 10% of Black residents and 18% of Hispanic residents), in Oregon uninsured ^{[1][2]}, and many more underinsured; and

3. the cost of health insurance has become a leading budget driver for employers of all sizes and in all sectors,^[3] including Benton County, and premiums are expected to increase 6 to 10% in 2024;^[4] and

4. health care expenditures including the Health Department and other healthrelated services of Benton County comprise more than \$61 million of the Benton County budget in the 2021-23 Biennium Budget;^[5] and

5. fifteen to 30% of expenses devoted to healthcare in the U.S. are consumed by administrative overhead, and a universal healthcare plan would cut those costs in half; ^[6] [^{10]} and

6. many people delay seeking needed healthcare due to an inability to pay,^[7] leading to a sicker and poorer population, which is significantly more likely to develop serious illness if exposed to COVID-19 or other infectious disease, and will subsequently face higher mortality rates from infectious diseases; and

7. unhoused populations and those groups experiencing racial disparities in the quality of healthcare use emergency departments at higher rates and are more likely to

have repeat visits than their housed counterparts, a fact that has been linked to a poor understanding of the *Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act* and Medicaid enrollment criteria, and results in increased hospital emergency room costs and to preventable deaths among the homeless population ^[8]; and

8. in 2019, at least 60% of Chapter 7 and Chapter 13 bankruptcy filings in Oregon included medical debt; ^[9]and

9. the current commercial-based healthcare system incurs high administrative costs, requires a burdensome and costly industry of intermediator, promotes incentives to shun high-risk patients and avoid low-reimbursement services, and to maximize reimbursements through up-coding and other undesirable means;^[10] and

10. only comprehensive universal health coverage can assure Oregonians that, no matter what health condition is ultimately responsible for their symptoms, or whatever treatment becomes necessary, all residents of Oregon will be financially protected; and

11. the Oregon Constitution states, "It is the obligation of the state to ensure that every resident of Oregon has access to cost-effective, clinically appropriate and affordable healthcare as a fundamental right;" ^[11] and

12. the Oregon Legislature in 2023 Created the Universal Health Plan Governance Board to bring a plan to the 2026 Legislature for implementing a universal healthcare plan in Oregon;^[12] and

13. the State-Based Universal Health Care Act (<u>H.R. 6270</u>) would help states, including Oregon, create state-based legislation guaranteeing full coverage for medically necessary healthcare, and would greatly facilitate the work of the Universal Health Plan Governance Board;^[13] and

14. local governments must often deal most directly with the consequences of our unaffordable and inequitable health insurance system; and

15. by passing resolutions and endorsements, local governments can help shape the national public narrative and build political will needed to ultimately win guaranteed healthcare for everyone.

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NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BENTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS THAT THE BENTON COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS:

1. Supports the enactment of federal legislation, the State-Based Universal Health Care Act (H.R. 6270). The bill will greatly help states create state-based universal and comprehensive healthcare for all residents, including the residents of Benton County, and will support current efforts in Oregon by the Universal Health Care Governance Board.

2. Thanks Representatives Hoyle, Salinas, Bonamici, and Blumenauer for cosponsoring H.R. 6270, the State-Based Universal Health Care Act (SBUHCA). We urge Senators Merkley and Wyden to sign as co-sponsors of an identical SBUHCA bill Senator Markey of Massachusetts will soon introduce in the Senate. We thank Senator Merkley for his support of universal healthcare at the federal level with the Medicare for All Act of 2023-24 (S.1655).

3. Will share copies of this resolution with our Federal delegation in the United States House and Senate and request a response from each delegate.
