OCWCOG wrapped up Rural Capacity and Ford Family Foundation grant work. This included staying in touch with rural communities, prospecting for grants, and looking at regional solutions.

CASCADES WEST BUSINESS LENDING

Cascades West Business Lending supports small businesses in Benton County with **1** active Ioan in Philomath.

EATS AND TREATS CAFE



CWBL was awarded \$1 million from the Business Oregon Community Lender Loan Loss Reserve Program (CLLLRP). As new loans are funded, they are enrolled in the program. If an enrolled loan defaults, after OCWCOG has completed its standard liquidation process, any remaining principal loss can be recouped by the program. This program will assist us in getting much needed capital into the hands of small businesses that may not qualify for conventional lending.

CORVALLIS AREA METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION

CAMPO staff drafted two successful grant applications for the Carbon Reduction Program, totalling **\$1.5 million** delivered to our members. One grant will purchase an electric bike lane sweeper by the CIty of Corvallis that will be shared among the region. The second will complete preliminary engineering for the Corvallis to Albany shared use path, a decade long priority project for Benton County.

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Meadow Knapweed Pull at West Hills Special Management Area (SMA)

BENTON SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

On April 28, 2023, Michael Ahr (BSWCD) and Shea Steingass (BCPW) hosted 10 OSU students for a meadow knapweed volunteer pull at the SMA on West Hills Rd and 19th Street near Lupine Meadows. This group was able to dig all of the knapweed that we could find, and the plants were hauled away to Coffin Butte for disposal.

We are reducing the amount of this noxious weed and are helping exhaust the knapweed seed bank. This is a great way to remove an invasive species near high quality endangered butterfly habitat. At this event, Greenbelt Land Trust gave the volunteers a tour of Lupine Meadows after the knapweed digging!

Benton Cooperative Weed Management Area (CWMA)



BENTON SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT

BSWCD coordinates the Benton County Cooperative Weed Management Area and many activities associated with the CWMA work help meet the requirements of the Benton County Public Works IGA.

1. Let's Pull Together Event. On

May 20th, more than 30 volunteers gathered at 5 Benton County sites to pull invasive weeds. Sites included Marys River Park, McDonald-Dunn Forest, Witham Hill Natural Area, Takena Landing, and Marys Peak!

2. **Oblong spurge.** We treated and monitored more than 40 oblong spurge sites. This is an ODA "A" list weed that we prioritize in Benton County. BSWCD employed a seasonal technician to assist with this project in 2023.

3. Invasive weed treatment. A

grant from Oregon Department of Agriculture funded ivy removal from trees along the Willamette River. Contractors treated 18 acres of forest.

Willamette Mainstem Cooperative

BSWCD coordinates the Willamette Mainstem Cooperative. Much of the work performed on the river relates to invasive species management.

1. Paddle and Pull Events.

On July 14th and 29th, Benton SWCD worked with Willamette Riverkeeper, Oregon Department of Agriculture, and Oregon Parks and Recreation Department to lead volunteers on a canoe trip down the Willamette to pull parrots feather and *Ludwigia*. 26 volunteers participated and hundreds of pounds of weeds were hauled away!

2. Yellow floating heart.

Surveyed 22 miles of the Willamette for this "A" list weed. We found 2 new sites this year, and currently treat 6 locations. Overall we've kept this weed from thriving along the Benton County stretch of the river.

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Item 3.4 March Broadband Update

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March 2024 Broadband News



Overview

There has been a great deal of broadband activity lately. Below is a summary of the happenings at both the state and federal level. Our team is here to answer any questions you may have.

Rural Prosperity Partners is a technical assistance firm supporting rural, frontier, and Tribal communities to secure state, federal and private funding. Our team has over 30 years of broadband and 40 years of resource development experience. Connect with us at connect@ruralprosperity.com.

State Analysis

State Broadband Technical Assistance Program (**BTAP**). The OBO received 27 complete applications for 33 counties and 2 Tribes (totaling \$4.4 million) for what is still \$1.5 million in funding. They expect to complete the contracts with the successful proponents in May. We may hear more about award decisions as early at the 21st during the next Oregon Broadband Advisory Council meeting. An initial scoring was presented by the OBO staff to the Grant Application Review Committee on March 14th.

The Broadband Deployment Program (**BDP**) (\$157 million) handbook has changed due to the many comments received in the last public review period. It has been released and is available on the Oregon Broadband Office's (OBO's) BDP webpage. The opening of the BDP application window was on March 25th. It closes on April 25th with award contracts to be finalized by September (estimate). On February 28th, the NTIA approved the OBO's Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (**BEAD**) Program's Initial Proposal Volume 1 (the final version is now posted). Oregon's challenge period will be limited to 30 days. In response to a question about the OBO's approach for coordinating speed tests, Krystal Stone (State BEAD Coordinator) said that the OBO had signed an agreement with Ready.net to run the upcoming challenge process. D.C.-based Ready already is doing this for multiple states (e.g., Louisiana, Virginia). Ready has its own speed test process, so this very likely is how the OBO will go.

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On Friday, March 29, 2024, NTIA announced the Digital Equity Capacity Grant allocations for states and territories to implement Digital Equity Plans. Oregon's initial \$9.9 million allocation is the first of the total expected funds. Additional funding will be made available by NTIA in the future. You can find the Plan, NOFO, and other information <u>here</u>.

The Oregon Broadband Equity Coalition (**OBEC**) officially launched on February 22nd. The next meeting is scheduled for April 25. If you are interested in being a part of this digital equity movement, let one of us at Rural Prosperity Partners (RPP) know, and we'll help you get plugged in. OBEC was formed by Oregon State University, Link Oregon, and RPP. Everyone is welcome to join.

Legislative Updates: HB 4040, which does away with the Grant Application Review Committee (GARC), has been passed by both houses of the legislature and is awaiting the Governor's signature.

Federal Analysis

The FCC has officially announced that the Affordable Connectivity Plan (**ACP**) ends in April unless funded by congress. The program ceased enrollment on February 7, 2024 and is expected to run out of money completely in April unless Congress acts. Oregon currently has 237,555 households enrolled (as of Dec 31, 2023).

There is so much just over the horizon for broadband in Oregon. It is an exciting time to be engaged in efforts to close the digital divide in our state. The entire RPP team is grateful for the opportunity to work with each and everyone of you. We eagerly look forward to seeing what we can all do together.

Local Analysis

Alyrica Networks, Peak Internet, Pioneer Connect as well local elected officials and broadband champions joined a USDA roundtable in March with USDA RUS Administrator Berke to discuss the launch of the Rural Prosperity Supported Broadband Technical Assistance Broadband Pilot, as well as challenges and opportunities to connect rural communities. We thank Alyrica Networks for hosting this event.

Alyrica Networks is participating as one of three rural Internet Service Providers in this pilot program and will be submitting a ReConnect (USDA) Round 5 application this Spring. Pionner Connect is also considering a ReConnect application submission this Spring.

Several Internet Service Providers will be submitting for the Broadband Deployment Program funding (Oregon Broadband Office), and most are preparing to submit for BEAD.


