This grant is a result of SB 80, which appropriated \$3,000,000 General Funds to OSFM for the purpose of carrying out community risk reduction and the local government financial assistance. 

#### Alsea Citizen Advisory Committee Membership Ratification

In 1997, the Benton County **Board of Commissions** established six geographically defined Citizen Advisory Committee (CACs) areas in unincorporated Benton County. In 2024, the remaining four, expired appointees were reappointed. Community **Development Department staff** supported the CAC to reorientation, developed a webpage Benton County Alsea CAC, created and implemented a recruitment for new membership, and is providing technical support for meetings.



The recruitment solicitation occurred in June with a flyer and direct-mail application sent to all property owners within the Alsea CAC Boundary (approximately 650 businesses and households). The solicitation was also posted on local social media sites and at the Alsea Library. The applicant's applications are included as Attachment 1. At the July 1, 2024 Alsea CAC meeting, members elected a slate via ballot for five vacancies;

- Zeb Olsen, Executive Board
- Tim Pearson, Executive Board
- Mystie Munsey, Executive Board
- Scottie Jones, Alternate
- Randy Hart, Alternate

The Alsea CAC is a public body for the purposes of ORS Chapter 192 and is subject to the statutory procedures related to public records and meetings. According to current CAC Bylaws, A five-member Executive Board and Alternates #1 and #2 shall be elected in each CAC area. Following election, each CAC Executive Board member and alternate shall be ratified by the Board of Commissioners, and officially recognized as a board member. Any resident, property owner, or person operating or leasing a business in the CAC area may be elected as an Executive Board



member or alternate. An alternate shall serve in the place of an Executive Board member who is absent from a meeting; Alternate #1 with first priority, and Alternate #2 with second priority.

Further, the CAC functions are to:

- (1) To ensure the opportunity for citizens of each CAC area to be involved in all phases of the land use planning process and other aspects of County government that relate to their CAC area;
- (2) To increase effective communication between citizens and elected and appointed County officials;
- (3) To encourage and obtain citizen input summarizing the varying points of view on

those matters brought before the CACs and to convey this to the Board of Commissioners, the County Planning Commission, and to other elected and appointed County officials; and

(4) To assist the Board of Commissioners and the County Planning Commission and staff in informing and educating citizens regarding the technical and legal aspects of land use planning.

The first project the Alsea CAC has indicated they want to work on is reviewing the current Bylaws.
